

This is War - and we are one soldier down

While all of the Otamatea Weed Control Group hate privet with a passion, Terry Hanna took commitment to the cause to another level so it was a terrible blow to lose him this last month. At 89 and still a great contributor, we were all inspired to do more and do better by his example. I am so glad we slowed down for a chat and a beer at the end of that last working bee. He was the life and soul of the moment as ever and I remember feeling blessed to be in the company of such lovely people. What a great guy and an amazing example of how to live life to the full - I am lucky to have known him.



So, why do we spend one Saturday morning a month killing privet? Let me count the ways!

Privet, quite apart from being an allergy irritant, has spread beyond town gardens and into our native bush to the point where we are now at risk of losing our bush areas.

The problem is this: the level of fragmentation of our bush in the Kaipara (small pieces of remnant bush rather than large forests) means we have a bigger 'edge effect' on each bush remnant and less protected inner area. At the edges weeds have the opportunity to surround the bush and, because privet germinates and grows faster than our native trees, it is now surrounding our bush remnants and beginning to move inside and displace native trees. This is happening now on larger properties just outside Paparoa, Matakohe and Maungaturoto. Bush areas are becoming completely surrounded by big seed-bearing privet and up to a 1/3 privet in the internal bush areas.

Without intervention privet continue to compete until it is all privet forest. It will also continue to spread deeper into the country-side to bigger farms using the roadsides as corridors and is therefore a threat to all our native bush of the Kaipara.

The roadside privet spraying by TaG Weed Control on the main highway and some roadsides (yes, those dead trees were privet!) is a great start for shutting down the corridors of privet.

At this stage Otamatea Weed Control Group (OWCG) is working on: roads not included in the contract, and private properties near Paparoa. There have now been four monthly working-bees to remove privet and eleagnus in the Paparoa area to help get privet under control in the district.

So far Paparoa Station Road has had Chinese privet removed at Wairere Road end, and tree privet at the Paparoa end with roadside spraying and cutting-and-pasting on private properties. A further property on the corner of SH12 and Paparoa Oakley Road has had cutting-and-pasting of privet done to start the keen owners off on their journey tp a privet-free property.

"Now we're going onto private properties we're really seeing the extent of the problem", says group member, Jacque Knight. "With so many large trees it is hard for individual property owners to keep on top of new seedlings being spread

around so removing these big seedbearing trees is a really important start."

OWCG's aim is to continue from here get and Paparoa privetfree before expanding down Pahi and Petley Road peninsulas on to Matakohe and Maungaturoto.

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

Work to begin on Medical Centre

Inspite of a number of frustrating delays work is about to commence converting the former Otamatea County and Kaipara District Council building into a modern medical facility.

Paparoa Village Health Care Ltd has engaged Trigg Construction Ltd to project manage the extensive renovations with local trades undertaking the work.

Paparoa Medical Society chair, Graham Taylor said that it is great to finally see the vision the Society had twelve months ago, when it purchased the former council building, become a reality.

We are confident the community will be well served by this facility. The Society is looking forward to all three of the ground floor tenants, Coast to Coast Health Care, Paparoa Community Library and White

Rock Gallery becoming part of a community hub. It will be quite a unique arrangement and all three entities should benefit. Whilst it is a requirement of the consent that the building be closed to the public during the renovation, it is anticipated this will be as short as possible.

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Matakohe Bridges project progressing well

As we have all experienced, this year's January and February weather has been atypical. For Fulton Hogan's team working on the Matakohe bridges project, the multiple weather events have bought challenges and they're working hard to make up for lost days.

Earthworks remain on track ready for the structures (bridges) team to commence on-site in April. More access roads have been constructed. and embankments building are up towards road level

to be ready for piling works. Limestone from the quarry on-site is being used as fill.

Work has commenced on drainage culverts and the first rock revetments (armour) are underway. Large spalls (rocks) are used to strengthen the embankment toes against stormwater and tidal flows.

The Earthworks Team will continue to excavate and install material up to late May and then recommence late October, weather dependent as it's not possible to continue during winter when working relatively close to waterways and when moving large volumes of excavated earth.

The specialist Bridge Team



is scheduled to arrive on-site to commence works at both Bridge 1 and 2 sites and will continue through winter, with a large crane arriving early April.

Traffic Management Supervisor, Owen, says driver behaviour through the area has generally been good. Cones on the centre lines serve to suppress driver speed near the site access points and at Anderson Bridge. We know these make it 'tight' for heavy vehicles and we're going to trial a section of cones with 'bollards' (the upright poles attached to the road surface seen on other roading projects). STMS carries out regular site checks. repositioning cones if needed.

Please continue to drive to the

conditions and give us a wave - it's great to connect with the community. Thank you for making us welcome in the community and we look forward to being your neighbours for the next two years! We presented a safety message to Matakohe

School students about the importance of staying away from the construction site, following signage and instructions from traffic management crew, including asking for assistance if they are unsure of how to walk or cycle past our work site. Please reinforce this message with family and whanau.

Your interest in the project is welcome, but for safety reasons we would rather you phone, text or email with queries, concerns or feedback rather than calling into the site office directly.

- a) The site is within Otamatea HarbourCare's area of activity (Maungaturoto free-calling area, Kaipara Harbour catchment);
- b) The planting is to be alongside a waterway or on erosion-prone land and <u>not</u> to satisfy resource consent conditions;
- c) It involves a minimum of 300 plants; and
- d) The landowner collects them from the nursery.

... then they will be FREE! Preference will be given to those who have already started a planting programme with us. The planting fee remains at 60c per tree regardless of who plants them -commercial or community groups. The trees are **not** available

for private landscape planting - we'd much rather that you support your local commercial nurseries for that.

A prayer for tolerance by Dorothy Quaife

Dorothy Harris was born at Paparoa's Edith Cavell Hospital in 1934 and was brought up on a farm in Te Kowhai Road, Ruawai. As a trained nurse she worked at both Middlemore and Auckland hospitals until returning home to nurse her ailing father.

She met husband-to-be Ancel Quaife early in 1954 and they soon married and lived in various Waikato forestry towns where Ancel worked as a civil engineer, constructing roading, sewage, and water reticulation, etc.

I was standing by the water, with a heart so filled with pain, When a small child took my hand in his and quietly spoke my name, "Please tell me what you see today, as you gaze out on this land Tell me of things like rainbows, with brightly coloured bands".

How dare this child disturb me, can he not see my pain? So with a voice full of impatience, I told him of hills, the flowers and trees, Of sparkling waters of the sea that caressed the golden sands.

"But what about the birds, he said, that fly so high and free? Please tell me of their colours, and don't be cross with me. I wouldn't ask these questions, but I really need to know, so in my mind I can draw pictures Of these things you've told to me so".

So then I looked down upon him, this softly spoken child, His face was full of wonder but his beautiful eyes were blind.

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Ancel worked for Otamatea County Council until he and Dorothy set up their own trucking called business Paparoa Transport while they raised their three children. Dorothy also held a heavy truck licence and could often be seen on the road working for the firm!

Ancel was well known for setting up the North Kaipara Coastguard VHF Radio Service in 1969 together with other keen boaties. Dorothy carried on this service for very many years until it was recently centralised in Auckland.

Dorothy wrote 'A Prayer for Tolerance' after her husband Ancel died in 1992. Some years after this, a greatgrandson was born blind so the poem became even more meaningful.

The Paparoa Press roving reporter was sent in search of this poem after we were told of it by Dave Porteous who thought there would be others in the community who would also enjoy it.

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
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
ANZAC DAY

ANZAC stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. Anzac Day was first observed in 1916- one year after the Gallipoli campaign of 1915 that saw thousands of soldiers killed on the Turkish Peninsula.

Since the first day of remembrance in 1916, participation in Anzac Day services has grown. The red poppy was one of the first plants to bloom in Flanders, Belgium after WW1 (1914-1918) and the best known symbol of remembrance throughout the world.

The Red Poppy (2012) is a sensitively written war story by award-winning children's author David Hill, and is illustrated by the talented Fifi Colston.

To accompany the book, Fifi created a red poppy template for readers to create their own poppies to wear or display on Anzac Day.

- Cut out poppy template.
- Bend each petal in half through the middle to give them shape.
- Cut out the black circles and cut a fringe around the large one.
- Push half a green pipe cleaner through the centre of the poppy and fold it over at the top.
- Glue the large circle over the pipe cleaner and the smaller one over that.
- Flick up the fringe to give it texture.
- When your poppy's finished, take a photo and upload to Fifi's Facebook page - Fifi Colston Creative.






'Fearless' author to speak

He was shot down after only a few weeks on active duty at the Western Front.

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
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Boxercise - new fitness fun

LED lights for Kaipara

Kaipara District Council has secured funding to accelerate its LED street lighting programme. Work to replace the majority of street lights in the Kaipara District with more energy-efficient lighting will be completed within 12 months.

The LED street lights are clearer and brighter than the old, yellow high pressure sodium lamps, have a significantly longer life, require less maintenance and have lower power usage, resulting in major cost savings. There is an added benefit in a drop in light pollution resulting in less glare or a 'yellow haze' as you approach a township at night."

The new 853 LED lights will cover the majority of local streets in the district and will cover all streets in local towns including Matakohe, Maungaturoto, Pahi, Paparoa, Ruawai and Whakapirau apart from those on State Highways. Local operator McKay Electrical has been awarded the contract.

theatre-goers are in for a treat. Four locally produced plays will be staged, starring locals, and in some cases, even the plays were written by locals.


One such play is 'The Argument', written by Pahi local George Skelton and Jane Mander. Bearing in mind that Jane Mander died in 1949, to co-write a play with her took some

skill. However, this is not the first time that George and Jane have collaborated, the first was for Paparoa's 150th celebrations, when George wrote and presented (with Peter Flower and ORT help) a play based on Jane Mander's novel 'Allen Adair'.

George's interest in Mander began when his mother gave him 'Allen Adair' which is set in Paparoa and districts. After reading it, he thought it would make a good movie, thought about it infrequently, until in 2012 his opportunity came to bring it to life. Subsequently, 'The Argument', has been adapted from an excerpt of Mander's book 'Strange Attraction', written in 1922 and set in 1912-14. It was "dramatically marvellous and forcefully intense" but on publication was instantly restricted for reading by women over 25 and then only in a library. Scandalous indeed, but by today's standards the subject matter would scarcely raise an eyebrow. In Mander's time she was not widely published as her books were considered risque, immoral and likely to corrupt the delicate morals of the day.

Skelton's 'The Argument' will be staged during the One Act Play Festival 2018 and theatre-goers should be safe from corruption. Come along enjoy the show regardless!




The Paparoa Sports and Recreation Association have a further event coming up on Saturday 7 April.

Autumn in the garden

The nights are getting cooler now and hopefully the flies and crickets will disappear soon. What a crazy season!

I've had no luck with my garlic as it did not bulb and I notice that NZ garlic has been a bit scarce in the shops too. However it's been a good season for tomatoes and cucumbers etc. The peaches have had a bad run of brown rot apart from the one that had the most battering with the wind.

My trial with baking soda on *nostoc* (the horrible dark green algae on pathways) hasn't totally got rid of it but I can say it's much reduced in area and quantity. While the algae does not grow where there is plant cover, now much of the former nostoc area is covered in portulaca weed (or purslane)

instead! Maybe the algae acted like a fertiliser?

I looked up this weed and found it is edible supposedly good for high blood pressure (4mg per gram Omega-3 fatty acid over 4 times the



amount that spinach contains). It doesn't taste like anything much but then I guess lots of lettuce doesn't either. Purslane is a very flat growing, slightly succulent plant so maybe it can stay and I can use it in smoothies ... It only grows in the heat of summer and dies in the cold of winter.

In the vegetable garden it's probably easier to buy in seedlings of cabbages, cauliflowers and broccoli as you don't want more than one at a time to eat. Broad beans can go in now, are easy to grow but need quite a bit of space. Peas can be sown directly; also carrots and beetroot while leeks are an excellent vegetable to grow with few pests.

Meanwhile the reliable gaillardia Arizona has been flowering for months and the dahlias, marigolds, zinnias, balsam and alyssum are still giving lots of colour. I have sweet pea seedlings growing well as are my recently planted out lobelia

This summer has certainly been very different with plenty of new challenges.


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

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Pets in the Valley

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
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Science Corner

Flies - a summer nuisance



companies must have been doing a roaring trade along with the sales of fly spray. I've now given up on fly spray as it doesn't seem to work anyway (except on wasp nests)!

Facts on Flies

- ▶ The housefly (*Musca domestica*) is a fly of the suborder Cyclorrhapha. It is believed to have evolved in the Cenozoic era, possibly in the Middle East, and has spread all over the world following human migrations. It's the most common fly species found in houses
- ▶ Flies cannot chew food, so they eject digestive enzymes onto what they want to eat (ie: spit on it). When everything is nice and soft, they then slurp it up! When a fly lands on something it spreads the bacteria and disease-causing organisms.
- ▶ Fly Anatomy. The head of the fly contains the eyes, antennae and mouthparts ... Flies have a pair of fully developed wings on the thorax, and a knobby, vestigial second pair of wings, called halteres, that are used primarily for balance. Flies taste with their feet. They live for about 3 weeks as an adult.
- ▶ Body temperature is governed by air temperature so the warmer it is the faster they go (moving, eating, mating etc).

Why so many this year?

A wet spring to get them started, followed by a warmer and wetter than usual summer gave the fly population a great opportunity to breed like crazy! They breed in decaying organic matter. The warmer the temperature the faster they breed.

Ways of controlling them

- ▶ Fly screens- expensive but good some always get in though as people go in and out the doors.
- ▶ Fly papers are cheap, look ugly, but they're effective and certainly get rid of most of them
- ▶ Fly swats also cheap, work well if you're fast, and electric ones keep kids and energetic adults amused on all flies present!
- ▶ Insect sprays don't work very well in my experience and I also don't like having chemicals floating in the air I breathe.
- ▶ Keep a good breeze blowing through the house- use fans if necessary. Flies don't like wind.
- ▶ Make an essential oil fly deterrent- mix 2tb vegetable oil, 2tb vodka or witch hazel and add drops of citronella, peppermint, lavender and eucalyptus. Put in small lids or containers to diffuse around your room. (Don't know if this works but it's worth a try.)
- ▶ Make sure all rubbish is removed quickly and compost bins are covered to prevent breeding places.

If all else fails, at least it is getting colder so they will disappear soon! Stella



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
Harriet at OUASSA Otago University science camp

Harriet Spoelstra is in year 13 at Ruawai College and writes here about her experience.

Earlier this year I went to Dunedin for a week's science camp (OUASSA) at Otago University and will return for another week mid-year. About 70 Year-13 students from all over New Zealand attended to experience studying science at a tertiary level.

Marine science was mv first choice for study. We conducted experiments on different marine species we collected from the beach or dredged the harbour seafloor from the Uni Research Vessel. We investigated the internal biological clock of different shellfish, looked at parasites cockle shellfish, infecting studied different species microscopically and dissected a large cancer crab.

Genetics was my other major subject choice. We looked at E. Coli bacteria for antibiotic resistance and tested our DNA for identification. I also chose a short elective, quantum physics, to look at the use of lasers



I encourage any student who may be thinking even just a little about studying science at university to apply for an OUASSA camp (or similar) as it's a such great opportunity to help you make that big decision about your future.



The weather!

2017 was the wettest year since 2008 when records began at Paparoa's local weather station.



Total 1425mm, well above the five-year average of 1237mm.

Rainfall above average for 3 months, about average for 5, and below for 4. But in March and April 2017, the rainfall was 245mm and 213mm respectively, exceeding the 5-year average by 143mm and 99mm.

What's already here and to come in 2018 - well measuring this Summer as the period December, January and February, we've had 377mm -compared to the fiveyear average of 180mm.

No wonder the grass is green and the dams and tanks are full.



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


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Garden rambles
