Connecting Paparoa

The 'Paparoa Connections' group of about 30 participants has been working to come up with ways to ensure the community has both user-friendly physical connections and social connections in and around Paparoa. As initiatives such as the Twin Streams Residential and Lifestyle Village, the new Medical Centre, and Paparoa School's projects come to fruition, it is important they can be easily connected.

FIVE AREAS THE PROJECT GROUPS ARE WORKING ON:

Matakohe to Paparoa Cycleway - Route options for how to keep the cycleway off the main road are being looked into. Discussions are being had with affected landowners and NZTA. An application has been put forward for the ride to be part of one of the 'Heartland' NZ cycle trails- from Dargaville to Mangawhai.

Village Shared Paths - Exploring options of how to 'get around the village', from Twin Streams and the Primary School, to the village shops and playground, without having to cross the main road is the focus for this group.

Community Activity Hub - Paparoa School has an overall multi-year plan in place and is focusing on the first of these, the cycle and pump track around the field, for kids to 'get on their bikes'.

Mountain Bike Track - This sector is really making traction. A one-kilometre track through the bush and scrub at the back of the showgrounds is already being cleared and is taking shape with the hope that it can be in use by Christmas. Look out for posters around the village and Facebook for more details.

Culture, Art and Heritage (Sense of Place) - Historical and cultural locations around Paparoa are being identified which can then be added to maps of walking trails. Ideas for art and sculpture installations are being investigated to see how they could be added to the trails or buildings. The group is also looking at murals on the buildings around the village. Any local artists who would like to be part of this please get in touch.

Members of the group will be at the Farmer's Market most weeks, so share your ideas and thoughts with them. We are also looking for a logo so if you have any ideas please get in touch. Updates will be provided regularly in the Paparoa Press, or for further information email paparoaconnections@gmail.com

The new board starts in January and meantime the Minister of Health will appoint four more directors in addition to the seven elected. This is to add any specific skills (usually finance) and to ensure each board reflects the ethnic diversity of the region.

During the election period I spoke with locals about health services and the board. The feedback and questions were really helpful for me to see what is working or not working for locals. This is an area I am really passionate about, especially in wellbeing and in prevention of illness- both physical and mental.

Following an initial meeting in September regarding concern about failing domestic and commercial wastewater systems, the Paparoa Wastewater Action Group was formed to explore potential solutions, for now and the future. The group comprises representative residents, business owners and community groups, including Council's regulatory and infrastructure team and Cr. Mark Vincent.

The Action Group is a closed group of a limited number of people who are tasked to seek potential solutions for Paparoa. Before any final decisions are made this will be discussed further with the Paparoa community. The bottom line is that ongoing pollution of the Kaipara Harbour is unacceptable, and a solution must be found. We all have a responsibility to support this action.

All property owners within the catchment (from the bottom of Trounson's Hill on Paparoa

Oakleigh Rd to Cutters Bridge on Pahi Rd and in Paparoa Valley Rd up to and including the Pines) were notified by letter that Council's Regulatory Team were to commence dye testing of their onsite wastewater systems. (Letters were sent to the legal owner of the property, so if the property is rented it was the responsibility of the landlord to let their tenant know.) Some owners took the opportunity to be present when the testing was done.

Although the dye testing programme was still in progress, Council met with the Action Group on 26 November to discuss preliminary results and to start to identify possible solutions.

The Action Group and the Council plan to meet again in February 2020 as there is more dye testing to be done and the results will be presented to the action group. On completion of this meeting, the action group will further work on finding a solution. A further meeting will be held with the Paparoa community after a solution or options have been proposed.

It's all in a word, or two Christmas, Yuletide, Noel, Cristes-messe, Khrīstos, Nativity ... The words we use, never stopping to think what they mean or where

they come from. Christmas is made up of two words, Christ (Crist originally) and derives from the Greek word Khrīstos, a Hebrew word 'Messiah' (meaning 'annointed') and the 'mas' is from the

Latin 'missa' (Missa being from the Eucharist, the tradition of eating bread and drinking wine in memory of Jesus).

It is claimed that the Cristes-messe dates back to circa 1038. However, the shortened form of Xmas is not some marketing ploy but came into being circa 1500's. Crīstos (the origin of the word Christ) is written 'Χριστός' in Greek. Using the first letter- chi, (written as X) - followed by 'mas'.

Of course, way back in the day it seems that Xmas was held around the time of the old Roman festival of Saturnalia, a celebration lasting from around the 17th December to the 25th. The Romans seem to have had a great festival celebrating their God, Saturn. Their alleged antics really do not bear writing about, at least not in the revered annals of the Paparoa Press.

And, if you ever wondered what that old carol Good King Wenceslas was on about, it is actually praising the actions of a Bohemian king battling a bitter winter to give money and goods to a poor peasant on the feast of St. Stephen, our Boxing Day! (The name Wenceslas is the Latinised version of old Czech 'Venceslav'.)

Last but not least, if you are wished 'Goodbye', 🦽 spare a moment to recognise the inherent blessing 🜌 ('God be with you ...'). Merry Christmas



Bike-packing on Tour Aotearoa

Did vou know that New Zealand's 'Tour Aotearoa' is one the world's great bike-packing trips and that the route comes right through our Village in the Valley?

Stretching more than 3000km from Cape Reinga to Bluff, the route follows a combination of cycle trails, tracks, paths and lanes, connected by the most enjoyable country roads available.

In our case this is **Paparoa Station Road**

as it heads east towards Gorge Road and into Maungaturoto.

Tour Aotearoa is organised every second year, drawing up to 1300 entries (both Kiwis and overseas travellers) over a six week period. It will be happening this coming February so you will see large numbers of cyclists on our roads around this time.

The event will certainly be followed by a steady stream of cyclists in ones and twos throughout the summer. They are mostly northern hemisphere cyclists touring



the world and they rate New Zealand pretty highly as a good winter cycling destination. They don't encounter packs of feral dogs here and they can sleep safely in their tents without fear of being attacked by a bear! Many are young professionals such as doctors, IT specialists and engineers and they are really interesting to talk to if you get a chance.

Paparoa Medical 2019 Report

The last year has seen the Society move from a state of limbo to fully realise its goal to establish a modern, fit-for-purpose medical clinic that will serve the community well into the future.

In December 2018 Brogan Builders Ltd was engaged to carry out the necessary renovations. The process went smoothly and the facility was ready for occupation by May 2019. I wish to place on record our appreciation of the manner in which Brogans and the associated trades carried out their work.

The Official Opening was well attended and marked a key milestone in the Society's history. We appreciate the patience of both Coast to Coast and Paparoa Library as well as the public during the period of closure for renovation. As key tenants, Coast to Coast Health Care Ltd and the Paparoa Community Library now have premises that are light, bright and easy to use and which have received many favourable comments from the public.

In undertaking this move the Society has strategically placed medical facilities at the centre

of Paparoa for the long term.

This project would not have been possible without the considerable financial support received from the Paparoa community. Individuals and community groups were overwhelmingly generous which showed our commercial lender the level of confidence from the community

The members of the Society have achieved considerable success and I value the support of all members. African Swine Fever - a threat to our farms

WHAT CAUSES IT?

African swine fever is an endemic disease in Africa. It is caused by a virus. It causes haemorrhagic fever which means it affects many body organs and blood vessels. AFS kills 80% of the pigs it infects.

WHICH COUNTRY'S PIGS ARE INFECTED?

China (hard hit, as it has the largest pig population in the world), Vietnam (4 million pigs killed), Philippines (7,000 pigs killed), North Korea, Laos, Cambodia and Mongolia. Also in many parts of Europe. It is now present in Timor - less than 1000km from Darwin.



WHY IS IT A PROBLEM?There is no known cure.

• It is highly contagious and usually fatal to pigs usually

within 7-10 days.
It is NOT harmful to humans either from pig

contact or from meat.
It is very easily spread by transferring on shoes or clothing.

• By NZ law all food scraps fed to pigs must be

Orrs Pharmacies 75th Anniversary

Orrs Pharmacy's is proud to celebrate 75 years of service to the Whangarei community and of the journey undertaken in that time to provide healthcare to the Northland community.

On 4th November 1944 William J Orr (Bill), father of Ken Orr, opened Orr's Prescription Chemist, on the corner of Cameron and James Street where Pascoes, Flight Centre, The Barbers and K&K Fashions are now.

Unwanted pest - Guava Moth



The guava moth, with a wingspan of 15 mm, was originally from Australia and was first sighted in NZ in 1997. It has become a real pest in commercial and home orchards, breeding all year round, actively moving from one variety of fruit to the next.

The moths lay their eggs on the outside of fruits - guava, citrus, apples, pears, plums and nuts. After hatching, the larvae burrow into the fruit with a pin-prick hole. It's not until the mature fruit is cut that the real damage is exposed. Other signs of

infestation include: premature fruit drop, exit holes, bruised fruit and larvae excrement on fruit.

I'm currently experimenting with this home made **Guava Moth Lure** formula which is proving to be quite successful. Put the mixture in empty milk bottles and hang in the fruit trees. I've emptied out a number of dead guava moths (and other harmful insects). Thankfully, bees are not attracted to it.



INSTRUCTIONS FOR GUAVA MOTH LURE

1. The Mixture: To 1 litre of boiling water, add 1/3 cup of sugar, 1 tsp Vanilla Essence (the cheap variety is fine), 1 tsp Vegemite or Marmite, and 1 tsp of ammonia (eg Handy Andy). Mix together to dissolve the vegemite and sugar; cool. This quantity is enough for 4x2 litre milk bottles- multiply as required.

2. The Traps: Cut a flap in the side of clean plastic milk bottles, with the opening at the top and pushed inwards. This enables one-way in for the moths, without letting in too much rain.

3. Hang the traps in the fruit trees with synthetic bailing twine (which will last for a number of years).

4. Refill every so often to keep the attractant fresh. Hopefully, you'll reduce this imported pest and get good fruit crops again.

Note: To be really effective, the traps need to be going almost year round. $${\rm Jan}\,R$$





Pets in the Valley

Last month was alpaca month for me. As more of these lovely animals move into the area I felt the need to upskill on my knowledge of care for these animals.



Despite their woolly looks they are not able to be treated as big sheep when it comes to medications and management. I visited a farm when shearing was occurring-quite different from my days in the woolshed. These animals were tethered to the floor while they were carefully shorn, hooves trimmed, teeth checked and vitamin D injections given before they wandered off again. They also produce a wide variety of noises quite unique to alpacas!

On a day field trip to South Auckland, a specialised lifestyle vet experienced in alpaca work showed us procedures

ranging from castration to blood collection for transfusion, and we practiced handling techniques and blood testing. We asked lots of questions about anything - it was good to talk with experienced owners about their alpacas.

As these animals are adapted to high altitude mountain life in South America, the transition to low altitude NZ is not without its complications - issues with Vitamin D metabolism and coping with parasitism and facial eczema are challenges for keeping these animals well. I look forward to putting some of my new knowledge into practice.

December gardening notes

In the garden one's mind goes towards making successive sowings and plantings of veges and flowers to be well established before Christmas with the uncertainty of how much caring and watering can be done. Plant out at dusk or on overcast days into well prepared moist soil enriched with organic matter (compost and sheep pellets). Mulch with wet newspaper and lawn clippings to protect the roots from hot sun and stretch out moisture content. In hot dry conditions you're better off deeply watering a section at a time rather than sprinkling everything. Save washing water - a bucket here and there will go along way to keep plants progressing and help pumpkins and fruit trees from dropping immature fruit.

Sow successive crops of beans (especially dwarf) and courgettes (those planted out in spring are now in production). Ensure you have new plants coming on as old and tired ones are pulled out. Replace these areas with successive plantings of veges such as beetroot, carrots. silverbeet, spinach. Other salad veges can be planted in semi-shade to help prevent bolting under heat stress.

Parsley is at its best now. To cope with excess - initially it keeps well in a plastic bag in the fridge- but if you whizz the leaves up and freeze in containers you can use it from frozen - scrape required amount off the frozen block.

Garden maintenance now includes mounding up soil around potatoes, tying up tomatoes as they grow, removing laterals and lower leaves, deheading spent flowers from roses, annuals and perennials for continual flowering, and weeding - even a quick hoe over now and then will help keep weeds at bay. 


