ne of the popular new stalls at the Paparoa Farmers' Market is Mario's Fresh Fish trailer. Mario and Jessie Jones had the trailer custom built after finding having a shop in



Maungaturoto was not really working for them. smoked mullet and kahawai,

Mario is the son of a fisherman and has been fishing since he left school at 16. He mainly fishes in the Kaipara targeting mullet and flounder. As a commercial fisherman he has to either purchase or lease quota from "quota brokers" so that each kilo of fish caught has to be paid for. As an example, quota for snapper ranges from \$5-8 per kilo.

Mario generally fishes in the early part of the week depending on tides and the weather, and everything is immediately iced and kept as fresh as possible. Then, of course, the fish have to be cleaned and filleted ready for the local sales.

They usually go to Dargaville on Friday, and Paparoa on Saturday mornings. They stock a fantastic range of seafoods which can include whole flounder and mullet, fillets of a variety of fish,

a range of shellfish, salmon, and some frozen products including paua mince, paua/ mussell fritters, kina and Kaihu Pies seafood pie. Check out the full range on their Facebook page Mario's Fresh Fish.

The last few months have seen Jessie's mum, Robyn, helping out in the trailer after Mario and Jessie's first child was born in early February. Jessie often brings Micah along to the market especially if it is a nice day.

They are really enjoying building their regular customer base at the Paparoa Farmers' Market and we often see people queueing up for their weekly seafood fix. Next time you're at the market treat yourself to your favourite seafood and make sure to have a wander through the rest of the market too. Pete

Autumn has well and truly arrived, and we're Amaking the most of the season by completing those last-minute jobs in the vegetable gardens.

Our Enviro programme continues to thrive, with students enthusiastically taking on seasonal tasks like composting, planting winter crops, and preparing the garden beds for the colder months ahead.

We're still harvesting from the gardens - spring onions, parsley, and believe it or not, even a few cherry tomatoes are still going strong!

In the kitchen, students have been cooking up a storm with delicious dishes such as sweetcorn fritters, pesto pasta served with a fresh salad bar and, for those with a sweet tooth, pear crumble and feijoa muffins. Alongside tasty these creations. they've been developing a wide range of kitchen skills from basic knife handling to learning how to zest, scoop, measure, and sift. Our motto in the kitchen is 'Try it once', and it's been amazing to see how many students leave the kitchen having discovered a new food they enjoy.

Planning continues for the development of our Ngahere (forest area) with students now getting ready to translate their ideas into drawings. Meanwhile, our native corridor is flourishing



- especially the manuka trees, which have seen great growth. Thankfully, most of the trees and shrubs have survived the drought. Our current focus is finishing the mulching to ensure the kikuyu grass doesn't overrun the area.

Learning across the school continues in full force. Our senior students have been New Zealand embracing Sign Language, building their communication skills in meaningful ways. The junior room took part in Road Safety Week, where they learned essential safety practices like looking both wavs when crossing and staying alert around driveways and reversing cars.

This term's main learning theme is 'Space' with a Matariki flavour, and classrooms are beginning to sparkle with planets, stars, and celestial inspiration. We're excited to see where this learning journey takes us as Matariki approaches.

Council Mark says-

Voters and volunteers are endangered species am concerned about the poor voter turnout for local body elections- on average well below 50% nationwide. Local Government NZ recently produced a draft paper on election reform to address this problem.

They highlighted the problems with the current postal voting system - fewer people have mail boxes, there are fewer post boxes and postal services are reducing their coverage in response to less demand for delivery of paper mail.

people, especially More younger people generally want to do stuff on line younger instead. Digital options for voting have been looked into, but the risks of results being corrupted by hackers seem unsolvable. There are also risks with postal voting- there have been rumours of voting papers being "harvested" from letter boxes in the past for the benefit of an individual candidate.

One of the twenty eight recommendations LGNZ is promoting as a solution is to change to in-person voting at a polling booth as for central government elections, and using national infrastructure to do this. I suspect this will likely come with an extra cost; it would be in the national interest if this cost was met centrally. This has a nice feel to it - so often the Parliament of the day has solved a problem by handing it to local government but without the funding to support it. This proposed voting reform would be an opportunity to return the favour. As Nelson Mayor Nick Smith said: "Reform is needed now to strengthen the democratic mandate local government has to represent communities across New Zealand". KDC did not contribute to the proposal as regrettably, from the beginning of the current term KDC is no longer a member of LGNZ, not something I voted for.

Finally, a shout-out to the volunteers in our community. The 15th-21st of June is officially the Week of the Volunteer. As I have said before, there are a lot of facilities and services which in larger, wealthier areas would be provided by the local council, but here in the Kaipara District are being provided only because local volunteers have stepped up. In small communities it usually comes down to a few key people who make these things happen. If you are one of those people, give yourself a pat on the back. If you know one of those people, give them a hug and/or a cuppa and treat them with respect like an endangered species. We need to cherish them.

I should point out that I am a trustee of Volunteering Northland, an organisation which acts as an introduction service between volunteer organisations and potential volunteers as well as providing a training resource.

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
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Working bee

We also harvested on Sunday 25th May, the first in quite a long time after the summer drought. It wasn't a huge harvest but we are very pleased to be supplying the recently opened food bank run by The Good News Church in Maungaturoto. Presently we are mostly picking rhubarb, silverbeet and some herbs while our winter crops and new beds are getting started.

Paparoa Primary School has also restarted sending four children every Friday from 9-11am to work in the gardens. In May they learned about the plants that fall



under the brassica family, have dug up potatoes and picked silverbeet to put into the Pataka Kai outside of the school. We would love to be able to offer this to more students however currently we do not have the volunteers to make this happen. Parental input would be more than welcome on these days to enable this. The children all have a great work ethic and are fun to work with.

Kaipara Kids from Maungaturoto have also been coming

along each Friday they are able to. They bring a selection of parents, teachers and students and work away in the gardens themselves alongside our volunteers. They have a strong will to teach their students about growing food and healthy eating which we are always more than happy to support. We try to ensure there is something available for them to take back and cook for their lunches in the kindergarten. It is always a pleasure to have them visit and be in the garden with us.

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I've been thinking..._



Our soil, so sadly desiccated in summer, has absorbed quite a lot of water lately but we are still (at time of writing at least) awaiting the sustained rain

which could waterlog the ground. Something to dread as it will almost certainly lead to accelerated erosion. Think of all those cracks that developed in summer filling with water, penetrating the subsoil and developing the grease - like planes which result in slumping and subsidence. Our roads will suffer, which is a worry as our Council seems to be a tad behind on maintenance anyway.

A week or so ago I phoned KDC to ask when they were planning to work on three problem areas on Pahi Road. These were the southern approach to Cutter Bridge, the slip about 4km down the road, and the subsidence at about 2.5km. A very nice person, who answered the phone after I'd had the pleasure of some "Muzak", didn't know what I meant by subsidence and couldn't find an answer so I asked to speak to someone who did and could. Another dose of "Muzak". I was assured that the relevant knowledgeable person would contact me. Fortunately I did not hold my breath.

However, in a strange turn of fate, work has progressed on the subsidence. Nearby residents must be delighted as some very disturbing noises were occurring as cars negotiated the growing bump in the road.

The work involves many vehicles and machines and

the persons they control. The area is embellished with 10 notices, a pair of traffic lights and about 90 delightful orange cones. But the work is happening.


Something is happening near the slip also- perhaps I should phone KDC to find out? Some locals believe that this site has been monitored for about 15 years. The cynical suggest that 'monitoring' is a euphemism for "don't know what the #* to do", "don't want to spend the money", or both. But let's abhor cynicism and be pleased that this one, increasingly dangerous problem, may be on the way to being solved.

Let me strongly advise you not to go under Cutter Bridge to observe that monitoring is also happening there. Be comforted with the thought that Blue or Shane are much more likely to initiate the need for urgent repair than you are.

These are the most obvious maintenance issues. There are at least three other places where the road is moving or the seal cracking to allow water access. And the road is only about 8km.

I'm assuming that every road on our local soils has similar problems and the ground is moving at a site near you. Unfortunately a wet winter will exacerbate the situation. It may not be a good time or motorists.

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Gordon Coates PM centenary celebrated

About 70 people from the Kaipara community and further afield gathered recently to celebrate the centenary of Gordon Coates becoming Prime Minister of New Zealand.

HERITAGE NEW ZEALAND Pouhere Taonga

Coates, who was born at the Ruatuna homestead near Matakohe in 1878, became Prime Minister on May 30 1925 after winning a caucus vote following the death of Prime Minister William Massey earlier that month.

He later won a landslide victory in an election held on November 4 1925 making him the first popularly elected New Zealand-born Prime Minister. Just over 10 years later he would become one of the foundation members of the New Zealand National Party.

Coates and his six siblings grew up at Ruatuna, a Category 1 historic place today cared for by Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga. The historic Coates homestead also served as the venue for the centenary celebrations.

Speakers at the celebration included Northland MP

Grant McCallum, the Chair of the Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga Board Dame Jo Brosnahan, Coates descendant Gordon Pryde and Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga Chief Executive Andrew Coleman. A tribute from Rt Hon Sir Lockwood Smith. former MP for the Rodney and Kaipara electorates and a local resident, was also read out by Dr Jason Smith.

official The party then proceeded the to Coates Memorial Church at Matakohe, a National Memorial cared for by Manatū Taonga Ministry for Culture and Heritage, and laid a wreath on Coates' grave.

"Gordon Coates was known for his appetite for hard work and for getting things done," says Ruatuna Property Lead

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The celebration of the hundredth anniversary of Gordon Coates becoming Prime Minister which was held at Ruatuna near Matakohe, the Coates familyhomestead today cared for by Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga.

"Among other things in the course of his career he completed the three main trunk railway lines; he centralised the construction of hydroelectric dams and progressed plans for projects on the Waikato and Waitaki rivers which are still generating power today."

Coates was also the first to acknowledge and understand the growing impact of the motor car, and funded roading networks from taxes on tyres, motor vehicle registration and fuel. He was also instrumental in passing the Reserve Bank of New Zealand Bill establishing a central bank.

Coates also earned a Military Cross for his action at La Basseville during World War I, and later served in Prime Minister Peter Fraser's war cabinet during the Second World War.

The anniversary kicks off a year of celebration, and people should keep an eye out for upcoming tours, talks and opportunities to visit Ruatuna.

LOVE it when fiction and fact are merged together into one glorious novel. If, like me, you have experienced a chocolate making class where you crack open cocoa beans and locate the nib inside, are talked through the process of preparing the



chocolate, and then temper some yourself, you may also have been left wondering however did we get Cadbury's Dairy Milk as an end product on the supermarket shelf. "The Chocolate Factory," by Mary-Lou Stephens is set in Tasmania in 1921 when the Cadbury brothers of Amish faith, started their unique second factory using rich, available and affordable, local milk products. It was an immense operation not without its problems and setbacks, including sabotage from rival confectionery-producers. The Cadbury family were dedicated to promoting staff wellbeing, unusual in that industrial era, and had a firm belief that the natural environment, housing and sound morals contributed to the good health of their workforce. Free passage by ship was part of the incentive to relocate downunder. The original Cadbury Factory was in the village of Bournville, in England. Recognize that name? Many interesting facts are revealed in the background to this story. The fictional tale is of romance, friendship, post WWI traumatic stress, women in the workplace, family life, early Australia, spies, saboteurs and villains.

To those Bookworms who enjoyed "The Single Ladies of Jacaranda Retirement Village," by Joanna Nell, you will chuckle over this one too, "Mrs Winterbottom takes a Gap Year". Two doctors, a married couple, find that retirement is not at all what they thought it would be. They have lost touch with who they are as individuals and as a couple. They have grown apart in their private life. They were a great team in their chosen profession, but now they find they no longer want the same things and are unable to compromise. He wants to take up enviro-friendly gardening, grow their own food, she wants to travel, Italy, Greece, all the places she didn't get to see when she was younger. She went straight to medical training, then marriage. She didn't have a Gap Year. He did. He had already been to all those places as a young man, partying his way around Europe and the Mediterranean with his mates. Council kicks the can on Paparoa wastewater

KDC councillors are about to throw four years of community and council work and dialogue around wastewater issues in Paparoa, into the bin. Businesses

On 30 April at their meeting Kaipara Tangiteroria, at council received a report with six recommendations on solutions to Paparoa's wastewater problems. The councillors took the easy option to do nothing to support Paparoa community. Cr Mark Vincent was unable to persuade his fellow councillors to delay a final decision pending further consultation.

The issue of non-complying waste systems in Paparoa has been ongoing since some dye testing was done pre Covid. A group of concerned locals, led by Progressive Paparoa, formed an Action Group to lobby the council and liaise between them and the community to get council support.

The Group raised \$25,000 and conducted a community consultation and report which strongly recommended that KDC work with the community to seek a solution. After further dialogue with council. they then allocated funds to develop a report with potential options and costs for a community wastewater solution. This report, copies are available, was finally presented late last year and outlines several options.

Then. without anv communications with the working group, with whom council have worked closely on this for last four years, council prepared and presented the report on 30th April with the recommendation to do nothing to support this community.

The total lack of communication about this to the Paparoa working group can only be seen as deliberate in order to ensure we weren't informed and could not engage with council about their report and recommendations.

NRC is responsible for pollution environmental and the wastewater bylaw is such that ultimately noncompliant properties may be red stickered. Some of the non-compliant properties may be residential and some commercial but to expect all these property owners to have the funds and available land space to become compliant is naive and council knows this. The report states that commercial entities that don't comply may be able to operate in Paparoa so long as they do not involve using water. That would be a challenge for any business. The report even suggested that people with complying systems could offer to take on their neighbour's wastewater.

The implications for us as a community are varied and none are positive.



may have to change or ultimately might disappear and homeowners may end up not able to comply and being unable to sell their properties. Growth will be constrained as any new house developments will need to have sufficient land to manage their own wastewater.

This is a thriving and growing community, and we believe it needs a community wastewater solution and that will need council support. We have a report commissioned by council which outlines solutions which, with council support, could be further investigated, confirmed and implemented.

The wastewater action group is not turning its back on this and will continue to lobby and work with council to achieve a positive outcome.

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Science Corner

Spider webs blowing in Transformer the wind

While sitting at one of the great new picnic tables at Pahi on a beautiful Sunday afternoon recently, a group of us noticed 100s of spiderwebs floating in the air being blown by the wind. The sun shone on their silken threads and we soon found the odd very tiny spider landing on the table. A truly fascinating sight.

This is known as ballooning or kiting. The newly hatched baby spiders release a special gossamer silk which enables them to be carried by the wind to travel to new



locations ready to build webs in new locations.

What do old spectacles, old hearing aids, can tabs, obsolete coins and wine bottle tops have in common? These can all be recycled to raise funds.



**Used eyeglasses, prescription and reading glasses, sunglasses and plastic and metal frames. Children's glasses are especially needed. Lions Clubs throughout New Zealand collect these and send them, via a processing centre, to be distributed to those with poor eyesight in the Pacific Islands. Visiting volunteer optometrists test and fit patients with these glasses at no cost.

Lions clubs also run the "Heads Up for Kids" project which helps young people engage in an experience or activity that will enable them to esablish life goals and reach their full potential within their chosen field. Many young people have benefitted from Heads Up for Kids, receiving scholarships to organisations such as Spirit of Adventure and Hilary Outdoor Pursuits Centres. Many thousands of **old coins and banknotes have been collected and the Reserve Bank of New Zealand estimates that there is still some \$80 million in old decimal and predecimal NZ coins still unaccounted for.

Also of interest to some people will be that Lions Clubs throughout the country support "Kidney Kids NZ". **The club accept wine bottle tops and can tabs off soft drink cans and funds raised go directly to Kidney Kids NZ who give support and services to children with kidney disease or disorders.

Maungaturoto and Districts Rotary



As mentioned last month students At Otamatea High were forming an Interact group, which gives them a chance to complete community service in areas they are agreed upon. This group has now selected their office bearers and are in the process of brainstorming the type of activities they would like to be involved in, so watch this space.

A highlight for us during the past month has been a talk given to us by Sir Lockwood Smith on the establishment of the NZ Liberation Museum (Te Arawhata - "ascent to freedom") in Le Quesnoy, Northern France, at a cost of \$16m, which opened in 2023. Take a moment to look through the website: nzliberationmuseum.com. Lockwood spoke of the history of this walled community over a number of centuries, culminating with the German invasion early in 1914. On 7 November 1918, this community was liberated by 140 NZ soldiers (90 of whom perished), but none of the 3,000 civilians were killed. Even Weta workshops have been involved and they have constructed a larger than life soldier which is on display there. While Sir Lockwood's speech was well received we were also able to present him with a Paul Harris Fellow award, which is the highest award that can be given in Rotary. In receiving this, Sir Lockwood mentioned that he really appreciated being recognized in this way in his local community. (Pictured Sir Lockwood with Alex Tetzner). If you go into our local RSA, ask to see the memorabilia that has been given to Maungaturoto in relation to Le Quesnoy.

We are in the process of being involved with two more Rotary Youth exchange students, one incoming in July and one outgoing in January. This is a great way for the young people to be part of a culture different from their own. We are looking for someone to host Alina (the incoming person) over the Christmas break. of theatre experience and has been performing in ORT shows for many years. He loves his role and has been enjoying making the part 'completely his own.'




